The District settled negotiations with its Adjunct Faculty United employees for a two-year contract for fiscal years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

Fiscal Year 2021-22: Salary increase by 5.07% and, for eligible participants, insurance premium reimbursements increase to \$1000 per semester. Fiscal Year 2022-23: Salary will be increased by funded COLA and, for eligible participants, insurance premium reimbursements increase to \$1,100 per semester.

The expected cost increases will be funded from the general fund.

**BACKGROUND**: Information is being presented to the Board on the status of the District's investments as well as the status of the assets in the Irrevocable Retiree Benefits Trust.

# **Quarterly Investment Report**

The Quarterly Investment Report for the quarter ended September 30, 2021, is submitted for the District's funds in accordance with Section 53646 (b) of the Government Code. During the quarter, there has been no change to Board Policy 6320, Investments.

- 1. The Orange County Treasurer's Money Market Educational Investment Pool. As of September 30,2021, the District had \$281,963,272.44 on deposit. The total of the Orange County Treasurer's Combined Educational Investment Pool, at net book value, was \$5,162,888,974 and the market value was \$5,171,503,899. This represents an unrealized gain for accounting purposes of approximately 0.17%, which equates to \$470,490.93 for the District. This paper gain is the result of a decrease in interest rates, which caused the values to increase. The average net interest rate for the quarter ended September 30, 2021, was 0.52%. Net interest earned for the quarter totaled \$362,007.30.
- 2. <u>Cypress College and Fullerton College Investments.</u> As of September 30, 2021, the colleges' investments total \$1,888,461.63. This amount was invested in certificates of deposit with the interest rates varying from **0.15%** to **2.96%**.

Investments in the Orange County Treasurer's Money Market Educational Investment Pool and the Cypress and Fullerton Colleges' investments meet the standards of Board Policy 6320, Investments.

## <u>Irrevocable Retiree Benefits Trust Report</u>

Starting in fiscal year 2017, after approval of action by the Board, the District began moving funds to its Irrevocable Retiree Benefits Trust ("Trust"). Investments of the Trust are made within the investment policy approved by the Retirement Board established for the Trust.

For the quarter ended September 30, 2021, the portfolio value changed from \$142,194,082.50 to \$141,316,259.18, a change in value of -\$877,823.32. No contributions or withdrawals were made during this quarter. The time weighted return net of fees was -0.62% quarter-to-date and 9.62% inception-to-date.

Counseling and Guidance	Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) Certificate of Achievement Completion of all the requirements in the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) will permit a student to transfer from Cypress College to a campus in either the California State University or the University of California system without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower division general education courses to satisfy campus general education requirements. However, students approaching readiness for transfer who are unable to complete one or two IGETC courses that are not required for admission to the university may request to complete IGETC after transferring. A course or sequence of courses used to satisfy a requirement in one area may not be used to satisfy a requirement in another area. Transfer students may also fulfill general education requirements that are specific to the school or campus to which they intend to transfer. Completion of IGETC is NOT an admission requirement to CSU or UC. It is NOT advisable for students who are pursuing majors that require extensive lower division preparation, such as engineering, to follow IGETC. Students must apply for IGETC certification in Admissions and Records. All courses must be completed with grades of C or better. Courses must be at least 3 semester or 4 quarter units in order to meet IGETC requirements. Courses must be on the college's approved IGETC list at the time the course was completed. Students should confer with their counselor regarding these requirements. In order to earn this certificate, students must complete 37-39 units.  Note:  CSU/IGETC Certificate of Achievement only confirms completing CSU and/or UC general education requirements and does not meet Associate degree or transfer requirements. Curriculum Matters

**BACKGROUND**: The Office of Instruction and the Curriculum Committee at Fullerton College and the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee have approved the attached summary of curriculum changes. All changes serve the mission of Fullerton College and are within the allocated budget for staff and facilities.

The Educational Master Plan has indicated that "instructional programs need to be continually reviewed as to viability and priority" and the curriculum "needs to provide state-of-the-art training in vocational programs." The assessment process, mandated by the state, provides several reasons for the proposed curricular changes: (1) to meet changing employment requirements, as per the recommendations of both the faculty and advisory committees; (2) to expand and streamline certificate programs in keeping with state mandates; (3) to provide meaningful categorization of Faculty Service Areas; (4) to provide specific courses to meet student needs; (5) to restructure programmatic curricula; and (6) to eliminate courses that either are no longer critical or that have been subsumed into other curricular offerings.

All curricula are submitted to the President's Office for review prior to submission to the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee.

This agenda item is submitted by Dr. Jennifer Combs, Fullerton College Curriculum Committee Chair and Dr. José Ramón Núñez, Vice President, Instruction.

How does this relate to the five District Strategic Directions? This item responds to District Strategic Direction #1: Student Experience & Success - NOCCCD will provide comprehensive support, equitable opportunities, co-curricular programming, and clear pathways to ensure that students achieve their educational and career goals. More specifically, Goal 1.1: The District will guide students to successfully navigate pathways for completion and lifelong learning.

**How does this relate to Board Policy**: The curricula are being submitted to the Board for approval as outlined in Board Policy 4020, Program and Curriculum Development.

**FUNDING SOURCE AND FINANCIAL IMPACT**: Funding for all curricula comes from the campus general fund.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the Board approve the attached summary of curriculum changes for Fullerton College, to be effective Spring 2022, Fall 2022, and Fall 2023. The curricula have been signed by the Campus Curriculum Chairperson and the College President, and have been approved by the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee.

This may include specialized work with student athlete eligibility. Incumbents must possess a thorough knowledge of all phases of enrollment services.

#### **ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS**

Examples of essential functions are interpreted as being descriptive and not restrictive in nature.

Coordinates and organizes the day-to-day activities within an assigned service area in Enrollment Services or assigned department to assure efficiency of operations; researches and investigates problems and identifies appropriate solutions. Acts in the absence of assigned administrator. Ensures implementation and maintenance of established local, state, federal, District policies and procedures and other agencies; ensures compliance with all regulations related to student records and athlete eligibility; including as established by conference constitution and bylaws of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and California Community Colleges Athlete Association (CCCAA), and other conference and professional associations. Assists in the development of revised District policies and procedures as necessary. Monitor student athletic eligibility in accordance with state conference and District policies, procedures, and regulations. Designs, prepares, and maintains student athlete records for the campus. Provides analysis and reporting of student athlete statistics and files with the appropriate administrative agency. Develops, coordinates, and delivers informational materials, presentations and workshops regarding programs and services; develops materials for distribution to promote activities and services; coordinates and participates in outreach activities to promote educational awareness, opportunities and services of the area of assignment. Gathers data and prepares statistical reports as directed; ensures compliance with applicable rules, regulations, policies and procedures, and state and federal laws; maintains a variety of difficult and complex documents records, statements and reports. Computes statistical data for graduation and verifies completion of final semester courses and calculates and tracks cumulative GPA; determines eligibility for graduation. Represents the District as an active member and participant at local, regional, and state meetings; attends conference meetings related to assignments as required. Acts as District representative/liaison both internally and with external partners and organizations. Evaluates academic records and transfer credits to determine student eligibility for admissions, general education requirements, programs, degrees and vocational certificates; coordinates printing of certificates and awards. Analyzes and audits traditional and non-traditional education materials for possible granting of college credits and maintains current knowledge of high school graduation requirements in California and elsewhere

9.	Provides technical assistance to students, faculty and staff on the interpretation of District policies and procedures, and federal and state regulations related to admissions, transfers, graduation, etc.
10.	Analyzes and applies local, state, and national college requirements; explains basis for evaluation made and provides information to students and faculty on evaluations and college requirements.
11.	Analyzes course descriptions; assists departments in evaluating courses for certificate programs.
12.	Reviews, analyzes and prepares student petitions, including academic exceptions and academic renewals; participate in meetings regarding student petitions and provide resource information.
13.	Assists and advises counselors regarding student records and makes appropriate recommendations and corrections; compiles and verifies information for State and Federal reports.
14.	Provides information and assists other admissions and records staff, counselors, instructors, other District departments, and outside agencies as needed or assigned; assists in registration as assigned.
15.	Processes attendance accounting and collection and recording of student grades, degrees and vocational certificates; processes student program changes.
16.	Trains and provides work direction and guidance to others as directed.
17.	Learns and applies emerging technologies and advances as necessary to perform duties in an efficient, organized, and timely manner.
18.	Participate in District/College efforts to increase the diversity of faculty and staff and to address student achievement gaps; active assistance in the creation of a welcoming and inclusive work and educational environment; attend and participate in diversity, equity and inclusion trainings and events.
19.	Performs related duties as assigned.

In response to realignment of educational or strategic objectives, decline in program quality or demand, resource availability, budget constraints, external factors, etc., the Board of Trustees may approve the discontinuance of an educational program identified as no longer appropriate to the mission and/or goals of the District in accord with Administrative Procedure 4021, Educational Program Discontinuance.
- 2.0 For purposes of this policy, an "educational program" is defined as an organized sequence of courses consisting of applicable coursework leading to a degree or certificate approved by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office.
- 3.0 The discontinuance of an educational program means that the sequence of courses will no longer be offered in a form that will lead to the approved degree or certificate, although all or part of the curriculum may be retained.
- 4.0 The District endorses the principle of collegial consultation with the Academic Senates regarding the establishment of a process for educational program discontinuance, which shall be consistent with the provisions of Education Code Section 78016 and the authority of the Board of Trustees to initiate and approve the discontinuance of the District's educational programs in accord with BP 2510, Participation in Local Decision-Making.
- 5.0 The discontinuance of any educational program under its charge is subject to approval by the Board of Trustees.

- 1.0 Courses that are designated to fulfill the general education and depth requirements shall meet the following philosophy:
  - The awarding of an Associate degree and/or a Bachelor's Degree is intended to represent more than an accumulation of units. It is to symbolize a successful attempt on the part of the college to lead students through patterns of learning experiences designed to develop certain capabilities and insights. It is to facilitate measurable student learning outcomes in vocational career and technical and liberal arts education. Among these are the ability to think and to communicate clearly and effectively both orally and in writing, to adequately utilize mathematics, to understand the modes of inquiry of the major disciplines; to be aware of other cultures and times; to achieve insights gained through experience in thinking about ethical problems; and, to develop the capacity of self-understanding.
- 2.0 The Chancellor, in consultation with the faculty, as stated in BP/AP 2510, <u>Participation in Local Decision-Making</u> shall establish procedures to assure that courses used to meet general education, Associate degree, and Bachelor's Degree requirements meet the standards in this policy.

- 1.0 In accordance with legislative intent, and through mutual agreement with local K-12 districts, the District may offer a comprehensive program of continuing education.

  - 2.1 Students may be awarded a high school diploma upon successful completion of a Board-approved curriculum.
  - 2.2 Students may be awarded a vocational certificate upon successful completion of the Board-approved curriculum.

- 1.0 The District shall have library and learning support services that are an integral part of the institutions' educational programs and will comply with the requirements of the Reader Privacy Act.
- 2.0 The purpose of the college library is to actively and effectively support instruction by serving as a resource for teaching and learning. The library shall provide access to information both within and beyond the library walls. The library shall provide information resources that promote a better understanding and appreciation of the cultural, practical and aesthetic elements of the world around us. Although the general community has access to the college libraries, these libraries are for the specific support of college educational programs, students, and staff.
- 3.0 Four important functions of the libraries are to:
  - 3.1 Maintain a relevant, multi-cultural collection, which provides materials to challenge each student according to his/her abilities.
  - 3.2 Provide an environment for students and faculty that promotes the development of information competency.
  - 3.3 Provide a professional and paraprofessional staff to assist and instruct in the use of information resources.
  - 3.4 Provide leadership in assisting faculty members to promote the use of library resources in instruction and curriculum, and in the development of critical thinking by their students.

- 1.0 Students in good standing may audit a course only if they are ineligible to take the course for credit.
- 2.0 If a fee for auditing is charged the fee shall be no more than \$15 per unit.
- 3.0 Students enrolled in classes to receive credit for ten (10) or more semester credit units shall not be charged a fee to audit three or fewer units per semester.
- 4.0 No student auditing a course may be permitted to change their his or her enrollment in that course to receive credit for the course.
- 5.0 Priority in class enrollment shall be given to students desiring to take the course for credit toward a degree or certificate.
- 6.0 Classroom attendance of students auditing a course shall not be included in computing the apportionment due to the District.
- 7.0 The Chancellor shall establish procedures and criteria for the auditing of courses, and ensure that they are published in the college catalog.

# **AP 4021 Educational Program Discontinuance**

#### Reference:

Education Code Section 78016; Title 5 Sections 51022 and 55130; ACCJC Accreditation Standard II.A.15; WASC/ACS Criterion 1, Indicator 1.6; Criterion 4, Indicator 4.2

- 1.0 **Statement of Purpose**: The North Orange County Community College District is committed to the vitality and integrity of its educational programs as defined in BP 4021, Educational Program Discontinuance and as validated by processes of regular and ongoing evaluation. The purpose of this procedure is to provide a framework for the effective consideration of program vitality that utilizes regular and rigorous institutional evaluation, and in those rare instances where consideration of discontinuance of educational programs is appropriate, to provide a framework and a process of effective engagement within which to consider the relevant issues and to come to an appropriate and timely institutional resolution.
- 2.0 Consideration of Collective Bargaining Rights: Nothing contained in this Procedure is intended to infringe upon, diminish, or supersede any collective bargaining rights established for employees of the District. It is the intention of the District that consideration of issues appropriately under the scope of bargaining be addressed through the regular processes established for such consideration by the District and its collective bargaining units.
- 3.0 **Process of Regular Program Evaluation**: The District is committed to regular processes of evaluation of its programs that support and advance the District mission. The colleges/NOCE shall engage in institutional evaluation processes in support of excellence and in accord with all appropriate statutory and accrediting body standards and requirements.
  - 3.1 Based upon information generated as a result of regular evaluation processes, the process of Special Review may be invoked at the request of any of the following site representatives:
    - 3.1.1 President of the campus where the program is located, or;
    - 3.1.2 Chief Instructional Officer of the college/NOCE, or;
    - 3.1.3 Chief Student Services Officer of the college/NOCE, or;
    - 3.1.4 Dean/Program Manager of the program under consideration, or;
    - 3.1.5 Department/Program Faculty from program under consideration, or;
    - 3.1.6 Academic senate from the institution of the program under review, or;
    - 3.1.7 Institutional Researcher.

- 3.2 Programs may be considered for Special Review in accord with the following Indicators:
  - 3.2.1 The following are considered Tier 1 Indicators. When any one of these criteria are established relative to a program, Special Review shall be initiated:
    - 3.2.1.1 Declining enrollment demand that is statistically significant over the course of at least two (2) academic years;
    - 3.2.1.2 Clear program obsolescence as indicated by appropriate workforce data scans of CTE programs or by recommendation of the program advisory committee;
    - 3.2.1.3 Loss of required program accreditation.
  - 3.2.2 The following are considered Tier 2 Indicators. When two or more of these criteria are established relative to a program, Special Review shall be initiated:
    - 3.2.2.1 Consistently and statistically significant declining retention rates for at least two (2) academic years;
    - 3.2.2.2 Consistently and statistically significant declining student success rates for at least two (2) academic years;
    - 3.2.2.3 Low term to term student persistence for at least two (2) academic years;
    - 3.2.2.4 Low rate of student achievement of program goals as defined in program mission and goals statements for at least two (2) academic years;
    - 3.2.2.5 Insufficient frequency of course offerings to provide pathways to student completion of program mission and goals;
    - 3.2.2.6 Unavailability of transfer major program of study;
    - 3.2.2.7 Decline in importance of program in support of other programs of the college/NOCE;
    - 3.2.2.8 Undue impact of program on resources of the college/NOCE.
  - 3.2.3 The institutions shall establish appropriate definitions and standards for the criteria listed above and may establish other criteria as mutually agreed upon by the College/NOCE President and the academic senate from the institution of the program under consideration.

3.2.3.1 At the time of the establishment of additional criteria under this provision, there will also be a determination establishing the tier level of the criteria.

## 4.0 Process of Special Review

- 4.1 When Special Review is invoked in accord with section 3.1 of this procedure, the college/NOCE shall convene a Special Review Committee (SRC) consisting of the following:
  - 4.1.1 chief instructional officer, voting;
  - 4.1.2 1 faculty member not from the program area selected by the academic senate from the institution of the program under review, voting;
  - 4.1.3 1 dean/manager not from the program area appointed by the President, voting.
  - 4.1.4 dean/program manager of the program area undergoing Special Review, non-voting;
  - 4.1.5 department/program coordinator, or designee from the faculty (NOCE), of the program undergoing Special Review, non-voting;
  - 4.1.6 institutional research officer, non-voting;
  - 4.1.7 1 faculty member from the curriculum committee from the institution of the program under review appointed by the academic senate, non-voting.
- 4.2 The Special Review Committee shall conduct a comprehensive review of the program that shall include, but not be limited to, the information serving as the basis for invoking Special Review.
  - 4.2.1 Subsequent to review of all of the relevant information, the SRC shall present its findings, including recommendations on a timeframe for resolution and a course of action, to the college/NOCE planning/governance body as established in accord with section 5.0 of this procedure.
  - 4.2.2 <u>Continuation</u>: The SRC may recommend that the program should continue. This determination shall be based upon a finding that the program under consideration remains viable and meets critical needs in accord with the District and/or college/NOCE mission.
  - 4.2.3 <u>Improvement/Revitalization/Re-Focus</u>: The SRC may recommend improvement, revitalization, or refocusing. Under this recommendation, an improvement/revitalization/refocusing plan shall be included in the recommendation. A program undergoing improvement/revitalization/

refocus under this provision shall be reconsidered in accord with a time frame recommended by the SRC or as modified through the regular site governance process.

- 4.2.4 Reduction: The SRC may recommend that the program be reduced in scope in conjunction with a finding that such reduction is appropriate and necessary in consideration of student and institutional needs. Along with a recommendation for reduction, the SRC shall indicate the rationale and shall also include conditions for reconsideration, if appropriate.
- 4.2.5 <u>Abeyance</u>: The SRC may recommend that the program be held in abeyance. Along with such a recommendation, the SRC shall indicate the rationale and shall also include conditions for reconsideration. Abeyance shall not be invoked for more than two (2) academic years without reconsideration by the SRC.
- 4.2.6 <u>Discontinuance</u>: The SRC may recommend that the program be discontinued.
  - 4.2.6.1 If the SRC recommendation for discontinuance is validated in accord with provisions of this procedure, a plan for discontinuance shall be developed jointly by the local administration and academic senate to establish appropriate actions and a timeframe conducive to the needs of students currently engaged in the program.
- 5.0 **Consideration by College/NOCE Governance Bodies**: Subsequent to a determination by the SRC, the recommendations shall be considered in accord with college/NOCE governance and planning structures as mutually agreed between the appropriate academic senate and the College/NOCE President.
  - 5.1 The local process of review shall assure the involvement of the academic senate from the institution of the program under review in a timeframe conducive to faculty consideration of the recommendation.
  - 5.2 After consideration of the determinations and recommendations of the SRC, the appropriate college/NOCE governance body of the institution of the program under review shall make a recommendation to the College/NOCE President for consideration.
  - 5.3 The College/NOCE President shall take action in accord with this procedure regarding any recommendation related to program status.
    - 5.3.1 If the recommended course of action is Continuance, Improvement/Revitalization/Refocus, Abeyance, or Reduction, and the College/NOCE President concurs, the College/NOCE President shall finalize and implement an appropriate plan in accord with the recommendation.

- 5.3.1.1 If the College/NOCE President does not concur, the matter shall be redirected and given additional consideration by the Special Review Committee and by the appropriate site governance body taking into account the concerns of the College/NOCE President.
- 5.3.2 If the recommended course of action is Discontinuance and the College/NOCE President concurs, a recommendation for discontinuance shall be forwarded to Chancellor's Staff for review and discussion prior to consideration by the Board of Trustees.
  - 5.3.2.1 If the College/NOCE President does not concur, the matter shall be redirected and given additional consideration by the Special Review Committee and by the site governance body taking into account the concerns of the College/NOCE President.
- 6.0 Consideration by the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee: Cross-curricular issues and program consideration will be considered by the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee prior to consideration by Chancellor's Staff.
- 7.0 **Consideration by Chancellor's Staff**: Any recommendation by the appropriate College/NOCE President for program discontinuance in accord with these Procedures shall be considered as an agenda item at Chancellor's Staff. In addition to the information provided by the College/NOCE, Chancellor's Staff shall also consider information relevant to cross-curricular issues and program coordination.
  - 7.1 Subsequent to discussion at Chancellor's Staff, if the Chancellor concurs with the recommendation for discontinuance, the matter shall be considered as an agenda item by the Board of Trustees
    - 7.1.1 If the Chancellor does not concur with the recommendation, the College/NOCE President of the appropriate site shall present the Chancellor's written rationale to the appropriate governance body for reconsideration.
- 8.0 **Consideration by the Board of Trustees**: The Board of Trustees shall consider any recommendation for program discontinuance from the Chancellor at a meeting of the Board of Trustees in accord with its regular processes and procedures. The Board of Trustees shall take into account all information generated in accord with these procedures, and any other information determined to be appropriate by the Board of Trustees, in their consideration of the recommendation.
  - 8.1 The academic senate at the site of the program under consideration shall have the right to address matters of program discontinuance at meetings where such issues are considered, including those instances where the academic senate disagrees with a recommendation for discontinuance.

### 1.0 General Education Requirements – Associate Degree

- 1.1 Educational objectives and intellectual interests of students working for an Associate Degree may differ; however, the awarding of the degree is based on the concept that students must achieve a defined level of knowledge.
  - 1.1.1 A minimum of 24 units of general education courses is required.
  - 1.1.2 Each college will submit to the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee (DCCC) additions and deletions to its respective general education course lists
  - 1.1.3 Associate degree general education courses taken at either Cypress or Fullerton College will satisfy associate degree general education graduation requirements regardless of the college within the District from which the student graduates.
  - 1.1.4 The colleges may establish local degree requirements in addition to General Education requirements in accord with Title 5 Section 55063. Such locally determined degree requirements are not subject to the provisions of section 1.1.3 of this administrative procedure and must be met in accord with standards established by the local college.
  - 1.1.5 State-mandated major disciplinary categories of general education courses are:
    - 1.1.5.1 Natural Sciences
    - 1.1.5.2 Social (and Behavioral) Sciences
    - 1.1.5.3 Humanities
    - 1.1.5.4 Language and Rationality

## 2.0 General Education Requirements – Bachelor's Degree

2.1 Upper division courses are defined as requiring lower division knowledge and applying that knowledge as demonstrated measures of critical thinking through writing, oral communication, or computation. Upper division course work may also

# AP 4026 Philosophy and Criteria for International Education

### **Education Code Section 66015.7**

- 1.0 International Education should encourage programs that support learning about other cultures, global issues, and the exchange of Californians and international students and scholars, such as:
  - 1.1 Develop courses of study in as many fields as possible to increase students' understanding of global issues and cultural differences.
  - 1.2 Offer courses in languages other than English to train students to communicate effectively in other cultures and to enhance their understanding of other nations' values.
  - 1.3 Provide opportunities for students in all majors to participate in study abroad programs to enrich their academic training, perspectives, and personal development.
  - 1.4 Provide opportunities for domestic and international students to interact effectively and routinely share their views, perceptions, and experiences in educational settings.
  - 1.5 Develop innovative public educational forums and venues to explore global issues and showcase world cultures.

#### 2.0 For International Students and Scholars

- 2.1 Encourage the presence of qualified students from other countries with sufficient geographic diversity to inspire an appreciation for differences among cultures and a deeper understanding of the values and perspectives of other people.
- 2.2 Facilitate faculty exchange and collaborative partnership programs with institutions in other countries.
- 2.3 Initiate collaborative research undertakings to address issues of global significance.
- 2.4 Encourage faculty to educate California's students as globally competent citizens.

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## AP 4030 Academic Freedom

Reference:

Title 5, Section 51023;

ACCJC Accreditation Eligibility Requirement 20 and Accreditation Standard I.C.7; WAS/ACS Criterion 2, Indicator 2.2 and Criterion 3, Indicator 3.5

- 1.0 The Association of American Colleges and the American Association of University Professors have long recognized that membership in the academic profession carries with it special responsibilities. The protections provided under this section are correlative with certain duties. Academic freedom must be balanced with the obligation of the District to protect the right of students to learn in an environment characterized by civility, open inquiry, and rigorous attention to the search for the truth, free of unlawful discrimination.
- 2.0 It is recognized that an essential function of education is a probing of opinions and an exploration of ideas that may cause some students discomfort. The District affirms the use of a variety of teaching methodologies to fulfill its obligation to raise difficult and meaningful questions in the educational development of students in curricular and co-curricular settings. Faculty members are entitled to freely discuss issues germane to their subject matter as measured by professional standards set by the community of scholars. This freedom involves the right to introduce controversial topics, as long as the manner of presentation involves objective reasoning and rational discussion. There shall be no curtailment of faculty presentation of factual or theoretical material relating to all points of view.
- 3.0 Faculty are citizens, members of a learned profession, and officers of an educational institution. When they speak or write as citizens, they should be free from institutional censorship or discipline. However, when doing so, they should apply the best standards of their professions and make every effort to indicate they are not speaking for the institution.
- 4.0 The District will consult with discipline faculty chosen by the Academic/Faculty Senate with respect to contemporary practices and professional standards for course content and delivery when evaluating issues of academic freedom.

# **AP 4040 Library and Learning Support Services**

Reference:

Education Code Section 78100; Civil Code Section 1798.90 (Reader Privacy Act); ACCJC Accreditation Standard II.B; WASC/ACS Criterion 7, Indicator 7.1 and Criterion 8, Indicators 8.1 and 8.4

- 1.0 Under supervision of the appropriate administrator, the college librarians in consultation with the faculty and dean from each academic area have the responsibility of coordinating the development and maintenance of a well-rounded, well-balanced collection of instructional materials, learning support services, and resources of the highest possible standard.
- 2.0 The library staff recognizes the obligation of college policies and procedures to promote free and open discussions as an educative force and to prepare students to deal with controversial issues. The library has the responsibility of providing materials on opposing sides of controversial issues and representative of the many groups and opinions prevalent in our society. The college librarians will establish procedures for materials selection.
- 3.0 As a measure of adequacy the library should review its collection against the recommended lists of materials for community college libraries, professional journals in all disciplines taught at the college, and current bibliographic publications. Broad objectives in selection of educational materials include:
  - 3.1 Providing materials that will enrich and support the curriculum.
  - 3.2 Providing materials that will stimulate growth in factual knowledge.
  - 3.3 Providing a background of information, which will enable students to make intelligent judgments in their daily lives.
  - 3.4 Providing materials representative of the diversity of the District.
  - 3.5 Placing principle above personal opinion and reason above prejudice in the selection of materials.
- 4.0 If library materials are questioned or challenged by members of the community, the questions should be directed in writing to the administrator of the library of the college involved, signed by the person raising the question, and indicating specific objections, page references, etc. The questioned materials will then be reviewed by the supervising manager and the college librarians. When this review has been completed, the supervising manager will respond in writing to the question/challenge and forward copies of the letter to the College President. The questioner may accept the review, or present an appeal through the College President and the District Chancellor to the Board of Trustees.

# **AP 4060 Delineation of Functions Agreements**

Reference:

**Education Code Sections 8535 and 8536** 

### 1.0 Delineation of Functions Agreement Development Process

- 1.1 In order to be in compliance with Education Code Sections 8535 and 8536, whenever the District is approached by another educational agency (public school district or community college district) to assume responsibility for any or all of that agency's adult education apportionment, the following procedure will be implemented.
  - 1.1.1 The President of the North Orange Continuing Education (NOCE) will receive the proposal from the requesting school district, containing a list of the courses, which they wish to transfer to NOCCCD, as well as an enrollment history for these courses for two years.
  - 1.1.2 The President will forward the proposal to the NOCE Curriculum Committee for review with respect to whether the proposed classes fit within the NOCE mission and curriculum. Such review would consist of, but not be limited to, information on course titles, course content, projected enrollment, location of and faculty credential requirements. The Curriculum Committee will present the proposal to the President's Cabinet for review with a recommendation as to whether or not the proposed transfer should be accepted.
  - 1.1.3 If approved by the President's Cabinet, a memorandum of understanding specifying a Delineation of Functions Agreement will be developed jointly with the requesting school district. The agreement shall contain all legal and contractual obligations of either or both districts under the program with appropriate time requirements. Furthermore, the written transfer agreement shall specify 1) that only courses that qualify as community college noncredit education under California Education Code Section 84711 shall be transferred and 2) the number of FTES proposed to be transferred from the district with the existing program.
  - 1.1.4 The memorandum of understanding specifying the Delineation of Functions Agreement will be submitted to the NOCCCD Board of Trustees for approval.
  - 1.1.5 If approved by the Board of Trustees, appropriate paperwork and reports required by the California Community College Chancellor's Office will be completed in a timely fashion and submitted for implementation.

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# AP 4070 Course Auditing and Auditing Fees

#### Reference:

#### **Education Code Section 76370**

- 1.0 The Board of Trustees may authorize a person to audit a community college course and may charge that person a fee pursuant to the Education Code.
  - 1.1 Students in good standing may audit a course only if they are ineligible to take the course for credit.
  - 1.2 The fee for auditing college credit courses shall be no more than \$15 per unit. Students enrolled in classes to receive credit for ten (10) or more semester credit units shall not be charged a fee to audit three or fewer units per semester.
  - 1.3 The Board of Trustees shall proportionately adjust the amount of the fee for term lengths based on a quarter system or other alternative system approved, and shall also proportionately adjust the amount of the fee for summer sessions, intersessions, and other short-term courses.
  - 1.4 No student auditing a course shall be permitted to change their enrollment to receive credit for the course.
  - 1.5 Priority in class enrollment shall be given to students enrolled in the course for credit toward a degree or certificate.
  - 1.6 Information regarding auditing shall be made available to students in the college catalog.

**BACKGROUND**: At its August 10, 2021, meeting, the Board reviewed the application process and approved staff to advertise for committee memberships. During this time, the following classifications would be vacant per Proposition 39: one (1) college support organization, one (1) senior citizens' organization, and one (1) taxpayer association.

Advertisements were placed in the Orange County Register (print and web publications), sent to city councils, posted on the District website, and campus social media channels. As a result, the following three (3) individuals have expressed interest in serving on the committee:

- Paulette Chaffee Has expressed interest in serving as a member active in a College Support Organization. Paulette is a licensed California attorney and has practiced in Fullerton for many years. She has previously served on the Fullerton Community Development Block Grant Citizens Committee, the All the Arts for All the Kids Foundation in Fullerton and is currently a member of the Friends of Fullerton College Foundation.
- Dr. Richard Rams Has expressed interest in serving as a Community Member. Richard served as the Dean of Student Support Services, Kinesiology & Athletics at Cypress College from July 2006 to February 2021 and is currently employed with Citrus Community College District as the Vice President of Student Services. He is also the President of the Buena Park Library District Board (BPLD) of Trustees.
- 3. Dr. Carla Rogers Skorin Has expressed interest in serving as a Community Member. Carla received her doctorate in education with a community college specialization from California State University, Fullerton. She was the Associate Dean at Southern California University of Health Sciences and has over 28 years of experience in higher education. She has also served as secretary for the La Habra Heights Aquatics Board.

It is recommended that all three applicants be appointed. Staff will continue to solicit for a senior citizens' organization and taxpayer association representative until the positions are filled.

# MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH ORANGE COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

October 26, 2021

The Board of Trustees of the North Orange County Community College District met for its Regular Meeting on Tuesday, October 26, 2021, at 5:30 p.m. via Zoom teleconference and YouTube livestream.

President Barbara Dunsheath called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. Cypress College Student Brent Dillard led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and provided a statement on what democracy means to him.

**TRUSTEE ROLL CALL**: <u>Present</u>: Ryan Bent, Stephen T. Blount, Jeffrey P. Brown, Barbara Dunsheath, Ed Lopez, Jacqueline Rodarte, Evangelina Rosales, and Student Trustees Erin Lacorte and Meena Pandian. <u>Absent</u>: None.

RESOURCE PERSONNEL PRESENT: Fred Williams, Interim Chancellor; Kashu Vyas, District Director, Fiscal Affairs; Irma Ramos, Vice Chancellor, Human Resources; Cherry Li-Bugg, Vice Chancellor, Educational Services & Technology; Gil Contreras, Interim President, Fullerton College; JoAnna Schilling, President, Cypress College; Valentina Purtell, President, North Orange Continuing Education; Kai Stearns, District Director, Public & Governmental Affairs; Raine Hambly, representing the District Management Association; Jennifer Oo, representing North Orange Continuing Education Academic Senate; Damon De La Cruz, representing the Cypress College Academic Senate; Kim Orlijan, representing the Fullerton College Faculty Senate; Christie Diep, representing United Faculty; Joseph Vasquez, representing CSEA; Dashiel Johnson, representing Adjunct Faculty United; and Alba Recinos, Recording Secretary.

**OTHER ADMINISTRATORS AND EMPLOYEES PRESENT**: Paul De Dios and Kathleen Reiland from Cypress College; Rod Garcia, Elaine Lipiz Gonzalez, and Jose Ramon Nuñez from Fullerton College; Terry Cox from North Orange Continuing Education; and Danielle Davy from the District Office.

**VISITORS**: Josh Chism, Brent Dillard, Caryn Menches, Justin Rich and Victoria Sodman. Public participation was provided via YouTube livestream.

### **COMMENTS: MEMBERS OF THE AUDIENCE:**

- A. **Caryn Menches** addressed the Board to express her outrage with their decision to implement a COVID-19 vaccine mandate that effectively changed her employment contract with the District without her consent. She expressed her objection to the vaccines and mandatory testing and warned that the District would be liable for injuries and side effects due to implementing an unlawful practice.
- B. Victoria Sodman addressed the Board to read a statement of behalf of Darrlene Alquiza, NOCE adjunct faculty, regarding updated information on the COVID-19 vaccine that has been unethically mandated for employees and students. She reported

that the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is currently being sued and urged the Board to reconsider the vaccine mandate policy.

**BLOCK VOTE APPROVAL OF NON-PERSONNEL ITEMS**: It was moved by Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown and seconded by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte that the following non-personnel items be approved by block vote:

Finance & Facilities: 3.b, 3.c Instructional Resources: 4.b

Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.

**BLOCK VOTE APPROVAL OF PERSONNEL ITEMS**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown that the following personnel items be approved by block vote:

Human Resources: 5.a, 5.b, 5.c, 5.d, 5.e

Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes.

### **CHANCELLOR'S REPORT**

A. Chancellor's Report: Interim Chancellor Fred Williams provided a COVID-19 update to the Board. He reported that on-campus COVID testing began on October 25 at Fullerton College and the Anaheim Campus, with Cypress College to begin testing on October 27. He shared that while he is vaccinated, he participated in the testing and noted that it was painless and he received his results within 24 hours. Efforts remain focused on getting the vaccination uploads validated; of the 10,566 uploads, 8,530 have been verified (81%). The District has provided training with legal counsel on review of student religious exemptions in anticipation of beginning to clear those soon. He concluded his report by noting a COVID update memo to all staff would be distributed the following day.

### COMMENTS

- A. Valentina Purtell reported that NOCE began weekly testing at the Anaheim Campus on October 27. The testing schedule will accommodate working adults and evening class students, no appointments are necessary, and accommodations for symptomatic individuals will be available. Staff also continue working towards ensuring compliance at multiple off-site locations. As part of their professional development plan, NOCE will partner with Dynamic Cultures to offer a series for classified employees that begins on October 29 and will cover strategies to get the most out of the workday. She also recognized Miranda Bates who received the 2021 District 6 Rising Star of the Year Award from the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations and Lori Guy and Lara Rofman who received the 2021 Vice President of Committees Award from the California Association for Postsecondary Education and Disability.
- B. **JoAnna Schilling** thanked **Brent Dillard** for leading the Pledge of Allegiance and all those who attended the Cypress College Science, Engineering, and Math (SEM) and

Veterans Resource Center (VRC) grand opening including **Board President Barbara Dunsheath** for her great speech and **Marc Posner**, **Kai Stearns**, **Chelsea Salisbury**, **Kristi Valdez**, and everyone who played a role in the meaningful celebration. She reported that Cypress College will have two more Vaccination Mandate Town Halls and staff are working tirelessly to finalize details in preparation for the November 1 implementation date. She shared that Cypress College recently held its first live theater production in almost two years for The Laramie Project that will be available for viewing via livestream. Student Resource Guides are now available on the college website with the official roll out scheduled for November 1.

- C. **Gil Contreras** congratulated Cypress College on their successful ribbon cutting and stunning buildings and thanked **NOCE President Valentina Purtell** for meeting with the Fullerton College executive team to discuss re-engaging and retaining students and continuing to build bridges between both institutions. He reported on meetings of the Business and CIS Advisory Committee and the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, & Antiracism Task Force. He thanked **Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown** for attending the sneak peek tour of the new Instructional Building and praised **Elaine Lipiz-Gonzalez** for providing districtwide leadership on the COVID-19 student workgroup.
- D. **Damon De La Cruz** reported that the last Cypress College Academic Senate meeting included updates for program review, guided pathways, and credit for prior learning.
- E. **Kim Orlijan** reported that the Fullerton College Faculty Senate endorsed the Faculty Allocation Committee Rankings for full-time faculty positions, that their November 4 meeting was canceled to allow as many faculty as possible to attend the chancellor finalists open forum, and on her attendance at the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) Area D meeting that included a review of resolutions that will be presented at the ASCCC Fall Plenary.
- F. **Christie Diep** reported that despite the District projecting a deficit every year, they have reported an ending fund balance of \$107 million in 2020-21 which is an increase of \$55 million from 2015-16. With those balances, faculty are still being told that they have to give in order to get, that family medical coverage is too expensive, and are being treated inequitably during the pandemic.
- G. **Joseph Vasquez** stated that CSEA stands in support of United Faculty and shared that CSEA membership has inquired whether trustees will comply with the vaccine mandate before returning to campus and whether outside vendors and contractors will be required to comply.
- H. **Student Trustee Erin Lacorte** reported on several events including the Cypress College SEM and VRC ribbon cutting, the Pluralism, Inclusion, & Equity (PIE) Series, the Hornet Leadership Retreat, and the October 29 Fullerton College Associated Students Halloween tail gate.
- I. **Student Trustee Meena Pandian** reported that Cypress College Associated Students will host a Trick or Treat event on October 29 and that Cypress College will have another town hall on October 28 to answer vaccine mandate questions.
- J. **Trustee Ryan Bent** reported on this attendance at the Cypress College SEM and VRC event and praised those involved in the development of the buildings.

- K. **Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown** reported on his attendance at the Fullerton College sneak peek tour of the new Instructional Building that he described as a great addition to the campus and a Measure J win for students, faculty, and the community.
- L. **Trustee Stephen T. Blount** reported on his attendance at the Cypress College SEM and VRC ribbon cutting and praised the event speakers for delivering remarks that were powerful and fitting for the occasion.
- M. **Trustee Evangelina Rosales** congratulated Cypress College on their new buildings and thanked everyone working behind the scenes to ensure a safe return to campus.
- N. **Board President Barbara Dunsheath** assured everyone that the intention of the Board with the November 1 vaccine mandate deadline has always been a safe return to work. She stated that COVID is disease that we are still fighting and shared that COVID related deaths in California are approximately 71,000 with 5,000 just in Orange County. She encouraged attendance at the chancellor finalist open forums and to provide feedback to the Board.

She reported on her attendance at the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) Conference where she was able to gain a national perspective on issues like the pandemic, safe return to campuses, and diversity, equity, and inclusion. She also expressed her appreciation for the community support for Measure J that allowed for the new Cypress College Science, Engineering, and Math (SEM) and Veterans Resource Center (VRC) that are centerpieces of community.

MINUTES: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Evangelina Rosales to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of October 12, 2021. Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.

### FINANCE & FACILITIES

**Item 3.a**: Kashu Vyas, District Director of Fiscal Affairs, introduced Justin Rich and Josh Chism, with Cooperative Strategies, who conducted a presentation outlining the 2020 Census and redistricting. The presentation highlighted the change in population by trustee area, change in District demographics (by race/ethnicity, voting age, age, household income, and English/non-English speaking), the current District boundaries by trustee areas and cities, the variance by trustee area including the total variance of 7.8% overall, and an overview of considerations in voting areas.

During the discussion, trustees thanked the consultants for providing additional demographic information, and also inquired about the release of demographic information from the 2020 Census, how the trustee area maps were previously drawn, why there was no community input, whether community input would be revisited, and clarification on what the 10% legal variance was based on. Interim Chancellor Williams stated that once the Board took action on the resolution, work would begin on the trustee area descriptions and developing an interactive map.

It was moved by Trustee Evangelina Rosales to table the decision to readopt the existing trustee areas in order to have more discussion, have more opportunities for community input,

and participation from the new chancellor. There was no second and the motion failed to advance.

It was then moved by Trustee Ryan Bent and seconded by Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown to certify the result of the analysis of the 2020 Census data's impact on the District's current trustee area map and approve Resolution No. 21/22-11 to re-adopt the existing trustee area boundaries. Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, and Rodarte voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes, and Trustee Rosales voting no.

**Item 3.b**: By block vote, authorization was granted to allow the Cypress College Foundation to host the Veterans Resource Center Campaign Veterans Day Celebration on the College campus on Wednesday, November 10, 2021, and to allow them to serve alcoholic beverages to attendees.

**Item 3.c**: By block vote, authorization was granted to enter into agreement with Graduate Communications for contracted service for the social media campaign at Cypress College in the amount not to exceed \$154,425 through June 30, 2022.

Further authorization was granted for the Interim Chancellor, Vice Chancellor, Finance and Facilities, District Director, Fiscal Affairs, or the District Director, Purchasing, to execute any agreement on behalf of the District.

**Item 4.a**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Student Trustee Meena Pandian to approve the summary of curriculum changes for Fullerton College to be effective Summer 2021, Fall 2021, Fall 2022, and Fall 2023. The curricula have been signed by the Campus Curriculum Chairperson, and the College President, and have been approved by the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee.

The item was pulled from the consent calendar by Student Trustee Erin Lacorte in order to highlight the new Social Justice Associate in Arts Degree for Transfer and to thank those responsible for developing and offering the degree. **Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.** 

**Item 4.b**: By block vote, authorization was granted for Fullerton College to enter into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Education to accept the total CCAMPIS Program funds in the amount of \$1,102,110, to be used by September 30, 2025, to support the participation of low-income parents into postsecondary education, and to adopt a resolution to accept new revenue and authorize expenditures within the General Fund and the Financial Aid Fund, pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Title 5, Section 58308.

Further authorization was granted for the Vice Chancellor, Finance and Facilities, or the District Director, Fiscal Affairs to execute any agreements and related documents and any amendments to modify the agreements on behalf of the District.

### **GENERAL**

**Item 6.a**: It was moved by Trustee Ryan Bent and seconded by Trustee Evangelina Rosales to adopt Resolution No. 21/22-09 reauthorizing remote teleconference Board meetings through November 25, 2021, pursuant to AB 361.

Board President Barbara Dunsheath stated that Interim Chancellor Williams had shared with the Board his expectation for in-person Board meetings to resume in the near future due to the vaccine mandate. She polled trustees for their preferences regarding an in-person return in December 2021 or January 2022. All trustees expressed a desire to return to in-person meetings, with a majority in favor of resuming in-person meetings in January 2022. An item to take action on a return to in-person Board meetings will be agendized for November.

The Board then voted on the motion to adopt the resolution, and the motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.

Item 6.b: It was moved by Trustee Stephen T. Blount and seconded by Trustee Evangelina Rosales to honor the contributions of past and present members of the Armed Forces in the state of California and in the North Orange County Community College District, and adopt Resolution No. 21/22-10 to declare that the week of November 8-12, 2021 be observed as Veterans Appreciation Week. Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.

**Item 6.c**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Evangelina Rosales to approve the CDC recommended vaccine series of FDA-approved, FDA-authorized, or World Health Organization (WHO) listed vaccines to meet the District requirement for COVID-19 vaccinations.

During the discussion, Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown outlined the different types of vaccine technologies and stated that studies show large differences between the Sinopharm BIBP and Sinovac-CoronaVac when compared to the AstraZeneca/Oxford and urged the Board to only accept adding the AstraZeneca/Oxford vaccine. Trustee Ryan Bent urged the Board to accept all three vaccines so that people wouldn't be forced to be revaccinated with another vaccine. Board President Barbara Dunsheath stated that at a recent ACCT conference, the guidance that was shared was that it would be acceptable to expand the approved vaccines as long as there was a consistent approach and was tied to an organization like the WHO. Trustee Ed Lopez inquired whether the District's current international students were allowed entry into the United States with any of the three WHO listed vaccinations. When polled, representatives from CSEA and Adjunct Faculty United voiced support for accepting the WHO vaccines if they were acceptable by the United States government for entry into the country.

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Subsequent to the discussion, the motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes, and Trustee Brown voting no.

**Item 6.d**: It was moved by Trustee Evangelina Rosales and seconded by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte to exempt students or employees that have tested positive and completed a 10-day isolation period from regular testing for a 90-day period as long as those individuals are asymptomatic.

During the discussion, trustees inquired about the process in place to ensure those who test positive continue to be asymptomatic during the 90-day period, whether the student check-in procedures are the same for employees, and what the initial wellness screening is comprised of. Campus representatives outlined the current protocol at their respective campuses and noted that they would review their campus processes to ensure that they are consistent with recommendations from health professionals.

Subsequent to the discussion, the motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, Rodarte, and Rosales voting yes, including Student Trustees Lacorte and Pandian's advisory votes.
